The National Organization of Nurses and Midwives of Malawi (NONM) successfully hosted a regional training on Event Planning and Management from April 01 to 04, 2025, at Sigelege Hotel in Salima.

The workshop was facilitated by the Norwegian Nurses' Organisation (NNO) and brought together nursing leaders from across the region to strengthen organizational capacity and enhance the effectiveness of professional events.

Participants included representatives from NONM and sister National Nurses Associations (NNAs) from Rwanda, Tanzania, and Zimbabwe. # **NONM Boosts Climate Action Through Tree Planting**

The National Organization of Nurses and Midwives (NONM) continues its climate change mitigation efforts by planting trees, using its local structures across the country.

Speaking on during a tree planting event at Thyolo District Hospital, District Commissioner Hudson Kuphanga hailed the tree planting initiative by NONM's Thyolo Chapter, which saw the planting of at least 90 tree seedlings.

"This is an exceptional gesture—combining the noble duties of healthcare with reforestation. I urge you to ensure the survival of these trees by employing proper care mechanisms," Kuphanga said.

NONM Thyolo Chapter Chairperson Ken Kaonga highlighted that the climate and health thematic area is embedded in the organization's strategic plan.

"Climatic shocks such as hunger are significantly impacting our profession, contributing to cases of malnutrition among the population," he noted.

Meanwhile, Acting District Director of Environment and Natural Resources, Mirriam Yona, applauded the initiative, saying it adds momentum to the district's reforestation efforts. She disclosed that Thyolo has so far planted 1.049 million tree seedlings, surpassing its one million target.

# NONM Takes Sign Language Training Online to Bridge Communication Gaps in Healthcare



Late last year, the National Organization of Nurses and Midwives of Malawi (NONM) took a significant step towards inclusive healthcare by conducting basic sign language training for nurses and midwives. NONM is currently continuing this initiative through an online platform using Google Meet, ensuring that the cohort which started the training gets to understand and know how to use sign language effectively.

The training is aligned with broader efforts to promote inclusive service delivery within the healthcare sector.

"Our goal is to ensure that no patient feels left out because of a communication barriers," said Scholastica Jimu, NONM Programs Manager. "By equipping our members with basic sign language skills, we are not just adding to their knowledge we are empowering them to provide care that is respectful, compassionate, and inclusive."

By investing in such inclusive initiatives, NONM is fostering a healthcare environment where all individuals, including those with hearing disabilities, receive the dignity and


quality of care they deserve.

"A hospital should be a place where every patient—regardless of ability—feels understood and cared for. We're breaking down communication barriers and creating a system where every voice matters, even if it's expressed through signs," added Jimu.

Participants, however, state that it is easier to understand the concepts through face-to-face interactions compared to online sessions. NONM acknowledges this concern, noting that the shift to online delivery was primarily due to limited funding for physical meetings.

This programme is one of many steps NONM is taking to build a future where inclusivity is embraced, and no patient is left behind.





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
